Macomb man pleads guilty to sex charge

A Macomb man pleaded guilty on Tuesday to charges of attempted criminal sexual assault.

Jared L. Williams, 24, was arrested on March 28 stemming from an alleged incident that occurred on March 20.

According to reports, Williams and another friend went to an apartment in Wigwam Hollow Circle to have dinner and watch movies with two female acquaintances.

Later that night, reports said the victim, relatively unknown to Williams, went to sleep on a mattress in the home. She told police that when she went to sleep, she was fully clothed, but woke up on her stomach with Williams on top of her in the act of a sexual assault.

Williams' plea on Tuesday was part of an agreement with prosecutors in which the charges were reduced from criminal sexual assault.

TIF talks ongoing with WP **School District**

Colchester Mayor Danny Bice said Monday that he will continue negotiations with the West Prairie School District before the city council defines the boundaries of a proposed tax increment financing (TIF)

At past meetings, West Prairie School Superintendent Dr. Jonathan Heerboth has expressed concerns that the district would funnel too much property tax revenue away from local schools.

Bushnell's swimming pool open for 50th season

Bushnell's municipal swimming pool is celebrating its 50th summer of operation.

The pool, located in the town's VFW Park on Cole Street, was established in 1960 by the Bushnell VFW Post #1422, with help from local businesses and community members. Dedicated in 1961 with a plaque on the wall of the entrance, the pool is managed by a municipal pool board. This summer, the pool employs 11 people, including co-managers Brandon Coates and Jim Howard.

The pool includes a bathhouse with separate girls' and boys' shower rooms; a basket room for storing personal items and a concession stand manned by volunteers. Through gifts and memorials, a sun deck was added in 1967 and later diving boards were added. The pool has a depth of 10 feet, 6 inches at the deepest end. Attendance at the pool has steadily increased since June.

"June was kind of rough because of the weather," said Coates, who is in his fourth season of working for the pool and occasionally serves as a lifeguard. "But everyday it's been warmer and we've done bet-
