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with your Better Business Bureau at www.bbb.org. The shop you select should have a good track record of resolving any complaints.

- Get recommendations. Talk to friends and family for recommendations. Ask your auto insurance agent, auto parts salesperson, or other business people you know.

- Do not pay in full until the repairs are complete. - Look for a mechanic with experience working on the same automobile model and make as yours. Seek out a mechanic with good credentials, updated knowledge and skill. Some shops display ASE (Automotive Service Excellence) certification, which indicates the mechanic has met basic standards in a specific technical area. You can also check for shops that participate in the AAA auto service program. But be careful; an ASE test or other certification is not an indication of ethics and integrity.

- Interview mechanics. Are they willing to answer your questions? Do they convey a positive, professional image? Ask if the technician or shop has experience working on the same model vehicle as yours.

- Ask the shop for the names of customer references. Then call those references.

- Look for a shop with a clean and well-maintained repair area.
