## Park report recommends safety update

A new report indicates that three parks managed by the Macomb Park District are in need of serious updates to catch up with current safety standards.

At Tuesday's Macomb Park District meeting, Director Ray Peterson went through a report critiquing Macomb's current parks.

Peterson said the small park on the west end of Patton Park, the "rocket" area of Glenwood Park and the main play area

at Everly Park were all pegged for up-

dates. Peterson said it's not that the parks are unsafe, but playground safety guidelines for new parks are constantly being tightened and the parks listed have been in operation for as long as 30 years.

"They do not comply with current playground standards," Peterson said. "As far as condition, they're structurally sound. We're not talking about something that could collapse or fall. They just don't comply with current safety standards."

## **Chandler Park:** 118 years young

A historical spotlight on a Macomb landmark, Macomb's Renaissance Man: C.V. Chandler

Walter Burnett will be giving free historic tours of Chandler Park at 1:30 and 3 p.m. Saturday as part of the Macomb's Heritage Days celebration.

Beginning at the arch on the north end of the park, Burnett's tour will include information on C.V. Chandler, a man Burnett called, "a model citizen," as well as information on the park's monu-

"The first thing my wife and I saw coming into town was this park with (the) Flags of Love up, Burnett said. "We pretty much said to each other if this community will put that kind of spirit into its veterans and its memories, then it's a place we want to live...The history of the park has become my hobby and passion."

The Flags of Love are the park's display of over 725 American flags, put up on national holidays.

Burnett said his research has lead him through many documents and Macomb Daily Journal articles.

"It's going to be an ongoing project to find more and more about it," Burnett said.

Burnett said the life of C.V. Chandler was, "a testament to that of a citizen, a businessman, and someone who stayed involved in his country and his city and certainly was one of the early promoters of Macomb that led to the prosperity of the early 1900s of this community.
